Agenda item/topic

National Park Closures

Presentation by NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) speakers:

- Claire Allen, Director of Policy & Engagement
- Susanne Larson, Manager Community Engagement
- Dr Will Batson, Area Manager, Upper Blue Mountains

Key Points include:

- 53 million national park (NP) visitors each year with changing demographics, eg not always well prepared, varying fitness levels, influenced by social media - risky behaviour eg ignoring signs for selfies
- Bushwalking is the most popular activity in NPs. 8 multi day walks are being established to cater for visitors
- NPWS duty of care for visitor safety requires they reduce foreseeable (reasonable person) risks mainly resulting from more visitors and extreme weather impacts on parks
- <u>Park closure</u> reasons include fire, pest/feral control activities, climate change impacts especially fire, flood, extreme heat, coastal erosion and sea level rise
- In the past 4-5 years, very high rainfall has caused landslides in the Blue Mountains NP eg Mount Solitary landslide, Federal Pass rock fall, Wentworth Fall landslide, Narrow Neck Trail Culvert Failure
- Multiple jurisdictions are involved with fire events visitors should check with RFS, hazards near me and NPWS
- Landslide Risk is managed using the Trigger action response plan (TARP) where actions are based on past landslide events and rainfall levels. Track
 closure decisions are based on forecast rain using the BOM forecast 50% chance
 of rain level. Many landslide events happen after rain. The beauty of the Grand
 Clifftop Walk is that it helps keep visitors safe above the escarpment.
- <u>NPWS</u> is the most popular NSW Govt website with 34 million page views per year. 3000 alerts per year, trip intentions forms (3000 in 2023), free PLB hire in some parks
- NPWS Feedback request:
 - O Do you use the trip intention form?
 - Would you recommend it? <u>Let us know</u>
- Visitors are recommended to use the <u>NPWS mobile app</u> for offline access to maps

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Questions

Q. Why in some Sydney parks does a rating of extreme danger often result in whole park closure?

This year has been unique due to a new fire danger system. In the Blue Mountains NPWS is learning how the system works in practice. A case by case approach is used for decisions on park closure.

Q. Trip Intention Forms are difficult to use for multi day/park trips - it is often best to submit an individual form for every park used.

The form is a prompt to tell people of your trip plans with the form focus being self-sufficiency. However, form improvements will continue - eg the multi-park issue.

Q. Campground bookings don't work outside NPs.

Unfortunately, different land management agencies don't work together as well as they should.

Q. When can BNSW comment on joint management of NPs eg Wollumbin NP, Mount Warning Summit Track.

This is a long-term process. Significant consultation about ongoing park management has occurred with indigenous groups. Next phase of consultation is with other interest groups. Refer to NPWS website for more information on the consultation process.

Q. Why have Blue Mountains fire bans not been lifted?

A consistent approach to fire bans across parks has been taken. Fire bans will be reviewed now that fire danger period has passed.

David Bell thanked NPWS for the very informative presentation and invited NPWS to be a regular visitor to BNSW general meetings. NPWS asked for a copy of questions posted.

Q. In the past walkers did solo walks trips over the Blue Mountains and took personal responsibility for their safety. Is there over-regulation of NPs and visitors today? DB view was probably not, given increased visitor numbers and lack of visitor bushwalking experience. Additionally, in a more litigious society NPWS must protect itself. The positive side of more NP visitors is higher awareness of the importance of conserving the natural environment.
